### New Project: Village Microfinance Fund

Thanks to the help of the TravelAid volunteers who conducted household surveys in poor areas around Siem Reap, Cambodia this last summer, we found an alarming problem in need of a solution.

Rural villagers, who earn less than \$50 per month, were paying exorbitant interest rates of 100-300% on their small business loans to local money lenders. The problem is that without collateral, banks refuse to give loans and lacking this ability to borrow money, it is nearly impossible for the poor population to establish credit.

Because of the high interest rates and without other options to start a small business, many find it difficult or impossible to implement their business ideas. What money they do make is needed to buy necessities and they are unable to reinvest in their business. Caught in this endless cycle they are never able to help themselves out of poverty.

To address this problem, JWOC created a Village Microfinance Fund. Based on the Grameen micro-lending system, this fund gives fair interest rate loans up to \$100 to local entrepreneurs interested in expanding or starting businesses.

A small business loan in the hands of poor entrepreneurs can transform their lives, the lives of their family, and entire communities.

Businesses funded by the Village Microfinance Fund include such things as market stalls, a tailor shop, a recycling business, and a pharmacy. To date all loan payments have been paid in full and on time. The men and women running these businesses are benefiting from small affordable loans that allow them to move out of the cycle of poverty.

### Village Microfinance Fund: A Personal Account

In prewar Cambodia, Wong-Mon worked as a nurse in Kandal Province near Phnom Penh. When the Khmer Rouge took over the country they began to actively search out and kill those with higher education.

When Wong-Mon figured out what was happening she wisely hid her identity and ran away to a distant village where no one knew her. During the next harrowing few years she had to watch the Khmer Rouge doctors, who had no medical training, give the people wrong and often harmful treatments, knowing that her knowledge could be her death sentence.

In the early 1980s, when the Khmer Rouge troops were being defeated and pushed into exile, Wong-Mon heard it was safe to go back to the cities, but she decided to wait until she was certain. When she finally returned to her former home she brought back a new family and nothing else.

The Khmer Rouge had destroyed her nursing certificate, all her

savings and possessions had been confiscated and the government told her she would have to go back to school if she wanted to work in the medical field. With seven children, going back to school was not an option for Wong-Mon, so she was forced to find other work.

Now at 54, with the help of the JWOC Village Microfinance Fund, Wong-Mon has started a small business in the local market selling cosmetics and medicine. Using her previous medical training Wong-Mon can help those unable to afford a doctor by giving safe advice. She used the JWOC loan to purchase more products allowing her to operate a more successful business. With additional inventory came additional sales, and her profit margin has grown dramatically.

Wong-Mon says she has more money for her family because of the fair interest rate on the loan, and she wishes to take out another loan in the future to further expand her shop.

### New Dollars for Scholars Students

The Dollars for Scholars Scholarship Fund gives high achieving students who could not otherwise afford to go a chance to attend university.

The program involves selecting motivated students who can demonstrate a keenness for self-study. Selected students can choose where they want to study as well as their desired major. JWOC then agrees to find sponsors for these students to help them complete their university education.

As part of their scholarship, each student agrees to give back 5 – 10 hours per week volunteering in the local community.

### Project Update: Peace Village

JWOC, in partnership with Cane International, raised \$8,000 for the Thanh Xuan Peace Village in Hanoi, Vietnam to support needed repairs and improvements at the center. Construction is currently under way to make the bathrooms safe, convenient, and wheel-chair accessible. Improvements to the kitchen facilities include providing air-tight containers for food and cooking utensils. The remaining funds have been used to purchase fans to cool the classrooms during the summer, and blankets to keep the children warm during the cold winter nights.
